The doors to the new Crowell Public Library opened to the public for the first time on Saturday, January 26, 2008. The library was flooded with both new and old library supporters. Visitors freely explored the first floor of the library with its expansive children's area, the Lifelong Learning Center, quiet reading porches and a community meeting room as well as the second floor's conference room and administrative offices.

The Grand Opening was a day long celebration full of activities and honors. Larry Mantle of KPCC and National Public Radio was master of ceremonies and introduced keynote speaker Steven Koblak, President of the Huntington Library, Art Collections and Botanical Gardens followed by Matt Ballantyne, City Manager; Lee Mothershead, president of the Library Board of Trustees; Robert Sievers, president of the Library Foundation, and Carolyn Crain, City Librarian.

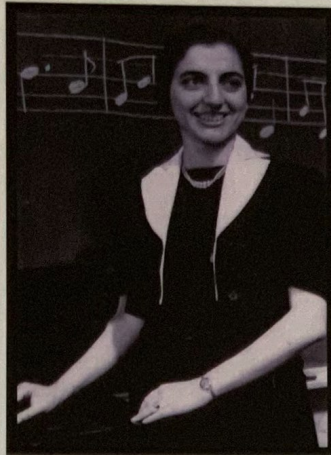
A Friend of the Library: Lucy Medz

The San Marino Public Library Foundation is fortunate to be the recipient of the generosity of Miss Lucy Medz. To our surprise, Miss Medz named the Foundation in her estate's gift planning. Since her passing in 2005, the Campaign to Build a New Library has benefited greatly. As a result, the second floor is named the Lucy Medz Memorial Administration Floor in recognition for her support.

Miss Medz became known to the library in 2004 after a handsome gift which vastly enhanced the audio collection of symphonic and operatic selections.

We would like to share a biographical submission by her loving cousin, Julie Ann Strong.

A 50-year resident of San Marino, Lucy Medz was born in Los Angeles on November 15,

1914. She was the fourth of five children. Her mother and father were Armenian immigrants to America at the turn of the 20th century. They both graduated from colleges in England and Turkey, respectively.

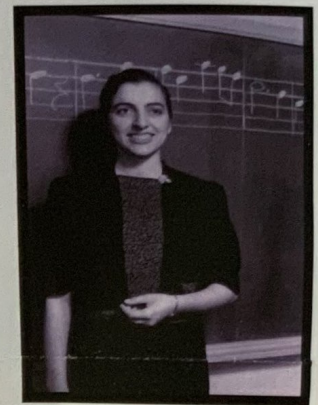
Lucy was a product of the Los Angeles Unified School District and graduated from Roosevelt High School. She graduated with honors in music from UCLA in 1935 and received a degree in Education from USC Graduate School.

She had a mastery of all the operas, famous composer's lives, and all the interesting stories that went along with them. She was a great accompanist on the piano and was even asked by her professor at UCLA, the great Arnold Schoenberg, to play at many performances at the university. She did it for awhile, but had to give it up so that she could concentrate on her studies.

Lucy served as Director of

the Concert Choir and Instructor of Music for more than five decades at Jordan and Lincoln high schools and El Sereno Junior High. She was greatly loved by her thousands of pupils and inspired many through her love of music.

The Donor Wall recognizes families, companies, foundations and individuals who have donations totaling \$5,000 or greater to the Brand New Library project.

A Cherished Friend and Leader Retires

On March 6, 2008, San Marino City Manager Matthew Ballantyne announced the retirement of Carolyn Crain.

"It is with a great deal of regret that I resign my position as City Librarian due to issues related to my personal health. I am indeed proud of my contributions during my tenure here in San Marino. It is especially gratifying to have realized the completion of the new library which has been the pinnacle of my service here in this community."

City Manager Ballantyne has not announced his plans for Crain's replacement at this point, stating, "At this time, I would like to revel in Carolyn's storied career. You will not find a more passionate individual who is committed to library services. Carolyn has accomplished a lot here in San Marino, and it has been an honor to have shared in those accomplishments these last two years. I would like to thank Carolyn's husband Alan for sharing much of her time with us as it has truly been a pleasure working with Carolyn."

Carolyn began her career with the City of Monrovia as an Adult Services Librarian then served as the Yucaipa Branch Librarian for San Bernardino County as well as the Regional Librarian where she supervised twelve of their branch libraries. In 1990, Carolyn was appointed the City Librarian for the City of San Marino.

The Foundation is proud to have had the opportunity to work with Carolyn for so many years. Her foresight and leadership were the driving forces behind the excellent library services offered to the San Marino community on a daily basis. Those qualities coupled with her tenacity and steadfast conviction that a new

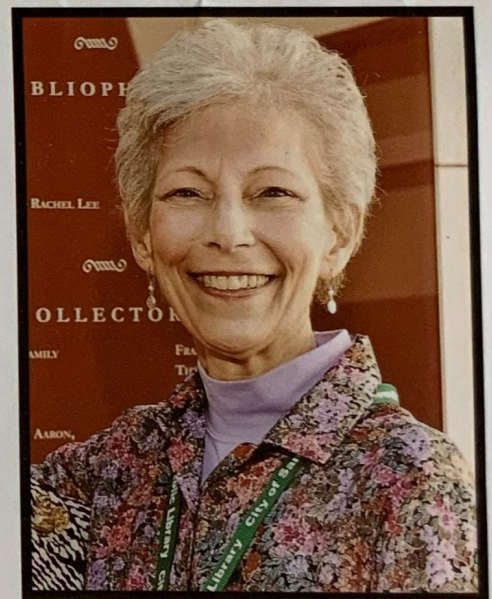

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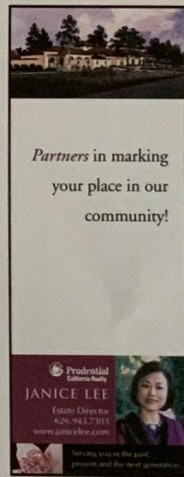
