I am Armenian. My parents brought me to the U.S. from Turkey in 1923 when I was 4 years old. All I knew about Turkey I learned from my parents. But I was anxious to see for myself. Throughout the years, when I looked at travel brochures, I found that no trip visited the city where I was born. I learned that Adana was a large, industrial city which had nothing to interest travelers. After my husband George died in 1990 I began to travel with girl friends—and eventually wore them all out! So I determined to travel by myself. NOW I found a trip to Turkey which visited my city; it was called IN the Steps of ST. Paul. In order to visit Ancient Antioch, the tour had to spend 2 nights in my big city. I planned to take that tour.

Dee and I met at square dancing in 1994 and began to date. One afternoon in 1995 while we were playing backgammon, he told me that he and Mary always wanted to see the places where St. Paul began churches in Asia—which is modern Turkey—and he would like to go with me! I was thrilled—someone to go with me!!

I had already visited Istambul with its beautiful mosques and other attractions and Ephesus, the complete ancient Greek city, but there were 3 other places I must mention: Cappadocia, an area in central Turkey where whole cities were carved out of the soft stone to house churches, monasteries, houses, etc. And the painted pictures on the walls and ceilings are still bright!! In fact, modern people lived in some areas until forbidden by the Turkish government in 1924 as unsafe.....

Pergamon Museum which contains the gigantic Pergamon Greek Altar and Babylon's Throne Room and Processional Way and other Asiatic art—all of which are overwhelming!! (Look at the Pergamon Book on the table.).....Underground City inhabited by early Christians who farmed above ground. But when fierce marauders came to kill them and steal their food, they built this underground city where they could hide and survive for long periods of time. They had a well, air ducts, cattle, churches, meeting rooms, living room, etc. etc. This underground city could hold 20,00 people!!! (We saw only a small portion of it.)

Ancient Civilizations of Mexico covered so many far-flung places that we had to fly four times in order to see the ruins of the Maya Indians, the Toltecs, the Olmecs, the Zapotecs, the Aztecs, etc. etc. You have probably all seen Mexico before, so I will not go into detail.
